Rabbi's Message:

Gratitude is always in order. As we enter 5784, let me express deep appreciation to our executive officers whose terms conclude September 8. Completing their terms, beginning with president and going through them all: Gary Rosenthal, Jeff Fine, Judy Aplis, Doug Wieder, Rich Berkowitz, Richard Freedman, Craig Appel, Bill Droë, Janet Newman, and Peter Freimark. The new officers will be installed at Shabbat Services, Friday, September 8. The incoming officers names and positions are listed on this page.

Rosh Hashanah is the time of year when we are commanded — not only to sound the shofar — but to listen to the sound of the shofar. Rosh Hashanah arrives Friday evening, September 15. As we prepare for the Jewish new year, let us contemplate the shofar, this most ancient of instruments.

There are many reasons for the sounding of the Shofar and listening to its clarion call. The 10th century Jewish philosopher, Saadia Gaon, gave the following:

- (1) Rosh Hashanah marks the beginning of Creation, and we, on Rosh Hashanah accept the Creator as our Sovereign, as it is said, “with trumpets and the sound of the Shofar acclaim the Sovereign Lord (Psalm 98:6).” We sound the shofar for CREATION.
- (2) Since Rosh Hashanah is the first of the 10 Days of Repentance, the Shofar is sounded to herald their beginning, as though to say: Let all who desire to repent, turn now. We sound the shofar to REPENT.
- (3) The Shofar reminds us of God’s revelation at Mount Sinai, as it is said, “the blast of the Shofar grew louder and louder (Exodus 19:19).” And so let us take upon ourselves — what our ancestors took upon themselves when they said, “We will do and we will hearken (Exodus 24:7).” We sound the shofar for the REVELATION of God’s teachings.
- (4) The Shofar reminds us of the Binding of Isaac (Genesis 22), who offered himself to Heaven and was replaced by the ram caught by its horns in the thicket. So ought we to be ready, at all times, to offer our lives for the Sanctification of God’s name. We sound the shofar for SUPREME SACRIFICE.

We kicked off the 2023-2024 Religious School year on Sunday, August 27th with classes, and the always popular DUNK TANK.



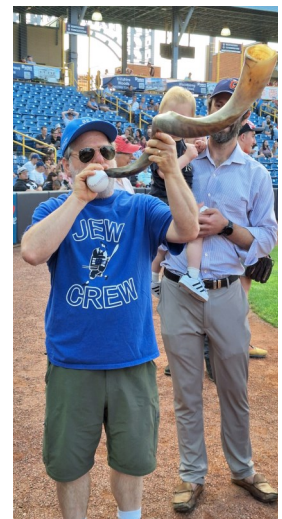
Staff changes:

Rabbi Matt demonstrated his skill as one of the local rabbis throwing out the first pitch, and as the solo shofar to rev up the crowd.



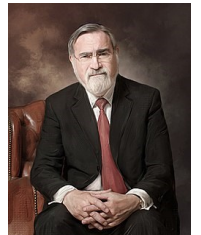

Tickets are required for most services* and will be sent to families who have paid their 2022-2023 fiscal year dues in full.

Additional tickets may be requested for immediate members (spouse, child or parent) of your family for \$90.00 each. For non-members or non-immediate family (aunts, uncles, cousins, grandparents), tickets are \$180.00 each.

**Except for Children's, Yizkor and Ne'ilah services. College students and military personnel with I.D. do not need tickets to attend.*

Parking. We will have uniformed Mayfield Heights police helping with traffic control in our parking lot. Just remember this phrase: In by the school, out by the shul. **Please follow instructions** as to where and in which direction to park (facing Lander School) so that everyone will be able to exit in an orderly manner. There will be a limited number of handicapped spaces available. **Be sure to purchase your parking space raffle tickets**, now available in the Temple office.

Bimah Flowers. Help beautify the Sanctuary and Atrium by making donations for lovely arrangements by Miklus Flowers. Donations may be made in memory of, or in honor of, loved ones, or as greetings for the New Year. Donation is \$180 for the entire High Holy Day period. These will be acknowledged in the Rosh Hashanah Service program and updated for the Yom Kippur Service program. Call the Temple office for information.

Tzedakah is a Jewish imperative, and an honored tradition here at Temple Israel Ner Tamid. On Yom Kippur morning, we hear the words of Isaiah 58, "Share your bread with the hungry."

(1) On Rosh Hashanah, we will distribute empty bags. On Yom Kippur, please bring your bags filled with non-perishable food items. We distribute them through the Jewish Family Service Association (JFSA). This is a "teachable moment" for your children and grandchildren, nieces and nephews. Take them with you for "tzedakah shopping." Let them help to fill the bag.

(2) During this time of "spiritual renewal" please make a donation to the "TINT Tzedakah Fund", which allows us to engage in many and various tzedakah opportunities, such as making and delivering PB&J sandwiches every Friday night, the Teddy Bear Bank and the PB&J van. The wood tzedakah box is on the prayerbook shelf as you enter the Sanctuary.

(3) Donation envelopes will be placed near the Sanctuary before High Holy Day services. Please take them home, and consider making a donation in memory or in honor of a loved one or a special occasion. Remember, in most cases, donations to Temple Israel Ner Tamid are tax deductible.

Donation: As you see fit.

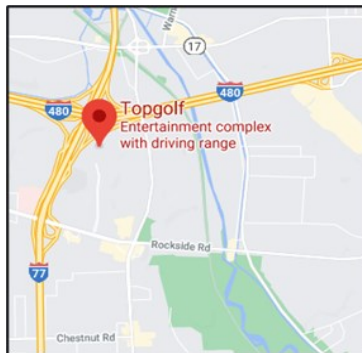

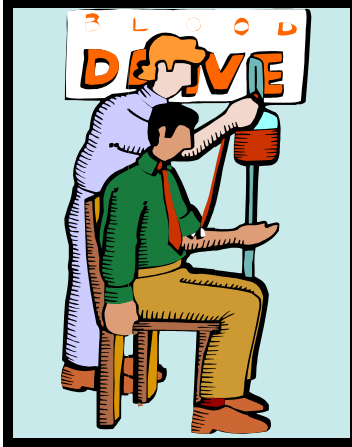

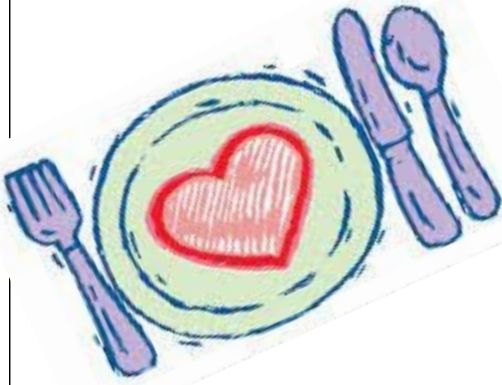

(5) Finally, the Shofar reminds us of redemption, that we may long passionately for it, as it is said: "It shall come to pass on that day, that a great Shofar will be sounded; and all the lost shall return (Isaiah 27:13)" We sound the shofar for the REDEMPTION of our people and all people.

Hear the sound of the shofar. Tekiah! For a moment, consider how you live your life. Now is the time to reconcile with others — especially those in your family — before it is too late, for we never know when our final opportunity to reconcile arrives.

We ask God to take care of us. We ask God to heal us and to help us.

Lord God, we are all Your precious children — as the month of Tishrei is ushered in with the sounding of the shofar — awaken us to walk in Your laws and commandments — to reconcile with others — of every race, religion, creed, and color. And especially within our families and the Jewish people.

Pat joins me, and the entire extended Eisenberg family, in sending prayers and well wishes for blessings and health.

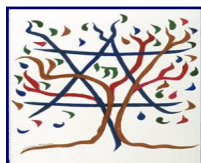
