Rabbi's Message:

(1) Contemplating life and death will focus our minds and behavior, if we allow them. Death is explained in the wisdom of King Solomon in Ecclesiastes 1:4, "One

generation goes, and another comes, but the earth remains the same." And what does that mean? Yes, people go and people come and the earth continues to spin on its axis, however, it is not the same as it was when we were in the company of our loved ones.

(2) On Kol Nidre, I encouraged all of us to remember our loved ones, pray for their souls, and let their souls influence our behavior. An important time to do so is on the Yahrzeit — the anniversary of the date of death. When we light the Yahrzeit candle, one of the things we consider is how our loved ones shed light and made this world a little brighter and a little better. When we light the Yahrzeit candle let us consider how we can shed light and make our relationships better and make the Jewish people stronger.

(3) Yizkor memorial services occur four times each year: on Yom Kippur, the 7th day of Sukkot, the 7th day of Pesach, and Shavuot. Each Yizkor service helps us sustain the bond that we, the living, have shared with our parents and other loved ones. Yizkor gives us an opportunity to acknowledge the debt we owe all of our forebears for the values they have imparted to us and the legacy they have bequeathed to us. It is solemn, yet need not be deeply sad. In fact, the writer Sholom Aleichem requested in his will that his family members assemble and read some of his humorous stories.

So, I ask you to come to synagogue for Yahrzeit and Yizkor. Not for my sake, but for yours and for the sake of the souls of your deceased relatives. I hope you will come to say kaddish because you want to. I hope you will come to say kaddish because it is the right thing to do. But, if neither of those reasons moves you, then I hope you come to say kaddish because you feel some guilt for having neglected to do so. Put to righteous ends, a little guilt is okay too. Kindle a Yahrzeit candle to shed a soulful light for your loved ones. Live your life to strengthen the light of your family and our people.

(4) Chanukah is a time to shed light. Chanukah begins late this year. The first light is kindled Wednesday evening, December 25. Yes, the date is a busy one for most people. See our TINT Chanukah Home

From the President's Desk

The meaning of Chanukah

The historical explanation is that the holiday commemorates the unpredictable victories of the Maccabean forces over the powerful Syrian Greeks. In the second century BCE the Greeks invaded and conquered the city of Jerusalem and all of Judea, desecrating the Second Temple and placing idols of Greek gods within its walls. As has been our fate, Jews were not allowed to practice their religion and were subjugated to Greek law. The heroism of the Maccabees, as told in the first and second books of the Maccabees, enabled them to restore the temple and rededicate it to the Eternal G-d.

Our tradition teaches us that it is truly a time of miracles as the oil for the holy lamp was only supposed to last one day and actually lasted eight. Hence the celebration lasts eight days and candles are lit each night at sundown to commemorate the event. Chanukah originally had two meanings; the festival of light and the festival of freedom, recognizing the eight day miracle, the improbable victory over the Greeks, and the rededication of the Second Temple.

This story of rededication and military heroism, however does not receive the same status among the holidays that are celebrated in the Jewish tradition such as Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur and Passover. In fact, the books of the first and second Maccabees are not included in the Hebrew bible. Chanukah is considered a minor holiday. The books however do appear in the Catholic bible as part of the Apocrypha.

Chanukah is a relatively minor holiday within our tradition, which is celebrated on the 25th of Kiflev, a date which varies every year according to its relationship to the Gregorian calendar. The date usually falls between the middle of November and the end of December.

It is well known that the history of the Jewish people has been darkened throughout the centuries by hatred, violence, and stereotypes. We were forced to leave what is now Israel because of the many invasions and wars resulting in the total destruction of the Second Temple and the beginning of the diaspora. In country after country we attempted to settle and hoped to be allowed to practice our religion in peace until such time as we could return to our homeland. But sadly that was not to be. Persecution continued and exile from the new countries followed. Assimilation and integration into these new societies came with great pain or forced conversion. To assimilate as a Jew became impossible.

Beginning in the 18th and 19th centuries we began to immigrate to the new world which provided a promise of freedom and a new hope. But this land which offered religious freedom was also primarily a Christian country with Christian traditions, practices, and holidays. The problem with assimilation for these new immigrants, while maintaining their Jewishness, remained ever present. One of the most important holidays in the Christian tradition is Christmas, celebrating Christ's birth. This is a holiday of joy, especially for

children, with colorful lights and gift giving. Christmas occurs on December 25th each year in a very close proximity to Chanukah. Giving of gifts on Chanukah was not always a tradition of the holiday. But in America Chanukah became a vehicle for assimilation. We give our children gifts each of the eight nights so we can more closely associate with the traditions of the season. We have taken a relatively minor holiday commemorating a victory over tyrants and a rededication of the Second Temple and transformed it into a seasonal celebration closely and erroneously associated with Christmas, all in an attempt not to be labeled as different.

Chanukah is a celebration of freedom and rededication of Jewish values. It is a reconnection to our great tradition; a tradition which many have fought for and died to protect. Maybe we should rethink our attempt in this country to connect it to the Christian tradition. Whenever I see a menorah beside, or even underneath a Christmas tree, I have mixed emotions. Is this an attempt to destroy the meaning of this uniquely Jewish holiday or an attempt to be included as simply part of a happy time of year.


